

BROCKWORTH ANNUAL PARISH MEETING
WEDNESDAY 18 MAY 2011
7pm Brockworth Community Centre

There were 20 people present.

The chairman opened the meeting and welcomed everyone to the meeting.

Apologies

Apologies were received from Brockworth Enterprise School, Brockworth Primary School, Castle Hill Primary School, Brockworth Youth Centre, Mr Richards (Allotments Association), Cllr J Perez, and Cllr Furolo.

Minutes

The minutes of the Annual Parish Meeting held on 19th May 2010 were received with no comments.

Annual Report of the Chairman of the Parish Council – Cllr J Hunt

The Chairman's report was circulated to all present and Cllr Hunt covered the main points in his talk. The full report can be read at the appendix 1.

Questions?

Q. What is a Quality Council?

A. The Clerk outlined the details of a Quality Council – a council has to demonstrate it has met a minimum standard of criteria relating to qualified clerk, numbers of elected councillors, engagement with the community etc.

Q. What's happening about the changing rooms on Mill Lane?

A. The Clerk updated the meeting – the existing planning permission expires at end of May 2011. The Football Club will update us soon.

Q. How much was the damaged dog bin to replace?

A. The installed bin was a second-hand plastic one and only cost installation. A replacement metal one would be about £200

Report from County Councillor Mike Collins

Cllr Collins congratulated all the re-elected and new councillors. Gloucestershire County Council has been dominated by the cuts over the past year. The current amount to be saved over the next four years is £114m. The main effects in Brockworth are the withdrawal of support for the library and youth centre.

The A46 landslip work still not quite finished. The Ermin Street traffic calming phase 1 has been completed. There are lots of proposed developments for Brockworth and Cllr Collins expressed that the parish must do everything it can to oppose unsuitable developments. The developers at Coopers Edge are looking to re-negotiate the section 106 obligations.

Questions?

Q. What is the 2nd phase of traffic calming?

A. Not been designed yet but will be down towards Hucclecote end of Ermin Street.

Q. What do you think the chances are of re-negotiating the section 106?

A. The Coopers Edge section 106 doesn't just affect Brockworth. Stroud District Council and Gloucester City Council are all involved in the discussions. Cllr Collins felt that the planning permission should also be varied in line with the changes to the section 106 obligations.

Statement of Accounts for the year ended 31st March 2011 – Mrs Julie Shirley

The full report was circulated to all present and can be read at Appendix 2. The highlights were read out by Mrs Shirley.

Questions?

Q. What is the Interest rate?

A. 0.05% on the 30-day accounts.

Q. Can any of the parish's reserves be locked away for longer periods to get a better rate of interest?

A. Yes, this can be looked at.

Q. Is the income fairly static?

A. Yes, all offices are let. The catering income has increased since we employed kitchen staff.

Q. What was the rights of way maintenance budget spent on?

A. But shelter cleaning etc. Full breakdown was provided to Mr Flounders after the meeting.

Q. What is the citizens' advice bureau money for?

A. The Parish Council subsidises a weekly citizens' advice bureau service here in Brockworth for residents.

Report from the Police – PCSO Jenny Norris

PCSO Norris circulated the annual figures to all present. On average, there are 2 crimes per week in Brockworth.

PCSO Norris outlined changes that will be affecting Brockworth in the coming weeks. PCSO Norris is being re-located to Winchcombe patch and won't be replaced in Brockworth. The Brockworth Community Safety Team will be located from Churchdown and shared around in a bigger team. The Brockworth police house is definitely closing, and the police will be discussing the option of having a room at a community building in Brockworth but will not be willing to pay any rental as the Churchdown station is only 3 miles away.

Cllr Hunt expressed how much PCSO Norris will be missed in Brockworth.

Report from Brockworth Allotments and Garden Association – Ernie Flounders

Mr Flounders gave the report on behalf of Mr Richards who was unable to attend the meeting. All the plots are in use, there are a couple that are being investigated as in need of attention and a letter will be sent to the plot holders. There are currently 14 people on the waiting list. It has been a quiet, trouble free year, with no vandalism and very little theft. The Allotments Association are grateful to the local residents that keep an eye on the allotments, and grateful to those that keep it running smoothly.

Questions?

Q. How long until someone gets an allotment?

A. Difficult to measure the waiting time. Allotments become available if people give them up or are ejected for not looking after them.

Q. Is the Allotments having a stall at the Fete?

A. Yes.

Q. Can we get additional allotment land?

A. Land is difficult to get hold of. There is nothing lined up for further allotments at the moment. Primrose Vale Farm was advertising allotments a while ago and offers a private rental arrangement.

Report on Community Bus and Elderly Groups – Cllr Carole Neal

There are 3 clubs for elderly Brockworth residents – Monday afternoons at St George’s Church Hall, Wednesday mornings at Royal British Legion, and Wednesday afternoons at St Patrick’s Church. For 20 years the parish council has paid for a minibus to take the elderly to their clubs. In 2001, the cost of the bus doubled and the Parish Council couldn’t afford it so the elderly clubs had to raise money. For the past 4 years, the Tesco developer money paid for the minibus and ran free return trips to Tesco. That money ended May 2011. The parish council has agreed a 12 month agreement for a once weekly service which will cost the parish council £150 per day (£7,800 per year). Mondays have been dropped and the bus will run on Wednesdays only. The clubs will be asked to contribute to the cost (£2 per trip per elderly club user), free for the Tesco trips.

Questions?

Q. What happened to Glos Minibus scheme?

A. It relied on volunteer drivers and couldn’t guarantee a regular service

Report from Brockworth Community Project – Maureen Rowcliffe-Quarry

The past year has been a big year for the Project, with a massive amount of changes. The Project has been putting together a plan to continue the Library and Youth service since December, involving much closer working links with the parish council. This has been a positive experience and a positive thing for Brockworth. Both organisations are working towards the same aims and working together is good for Brockworth. The Community Project is open Tuesday to Friday 11am to 4pm and is staffed by 3 part-time people so sometimes the office will not be manned due to holidays and sickness. The Project has about 100 students on the books at any one time. Maths is not running at the moment but English is about to start again.

Report from Tewkesbury Borough Councillors – Cllr V Perez and Cllr M Rowcliffe-Quarry

A report was circulated and can be read at Appendix 3. Cllr Perez and Cllr Rowcliffe-Quarry went through the main points.

Tewkesbury Borough Council has made a lot of effort in the past year to improve communications with parish councils and borough residents.

Questions?

Q. Has anything been decided about the advice centre at Brockworth?

A. No decisions made. They are looking at different ways of working.

Report from the Tree Warden – Ernie Flounders

A report was circulated and can be read at Appendix 4. Mr Flounders ran through the main points. The importance of tree wardens working with the public gets better every year. People are genuinely interested in what’s being done. Mr Flounders is recording old and ancient trees on behalf of the Woodland Trust, which may lead to an application to government to do something to protect old trees (some trees could be up to 1000 years old). If anyone knows of any old trees, please inform the parish office.

Perry Pear Trees are included in the green buffer area of the kennel lane planning application. Cllr Rowcliffe-Quarry still has the petition to request TPO on the Perry Pear trees and is waiting for the Kennel Lane application to be decided before presenting the petition to Tewkesbury Borough Council.

There was a Community Tree planting event at Cross Hands Meadow with 105 free trees from the Woodland Trust. The trees are growing well, with only one not growing which was probably following the damage by 3 young people. We've applied for another free pack for this Autumn.

Gloucestershire County Council has promised to replant trees on the A46 following the landslip work so we must monitor to the tree replanting is done.

Mr Flounders gave a brief update on the Nature Reserve. Tewkesbury Borough Council has replanted the wildlife corridor and replaced a lot of the dead trees. New fences have been erected all the way around with a 6' wooden fence all the way around. Mr Flounders has been asked to generally tidy it up which will be a big job. Most of the neighbours have been very helpful. The Parish Council was very supportive 18 months ago, and had offered to take over the land but no progress on that.

Mrs Fay Bennett (assistant parish clerk) has a tree log and keeps a record of all historic, noteworthy, and newly planted trees. Mr Flounders noted that it was a pleasure to come into this community centre.

Questions?

Q. What variety of trees has been planted at Cross Hands Meadow?

A. Oak, birch, hawthorne, field maple, rowan. All 1 metre – 2 metres apart, once they have been established, those that are too close together will be moved. Naturally the stronger tree thrives and weaker trees die.

Q. Where is Nature Close?

A. Off Green Bank

Mrs Iris German noted a new tree had been planted at Lasne Crescent on Tewkesbury Borough Council land. Mr Flounders agreed to have a look.

There being no further reports or questions from members of the public, the meeting closed at 8.40pm.

Appendix 1

CHAIRMAN'S ANNUAL REPORT FOR THE YEAR APRIL 2010 to MARCH 2011

Introduction

The annual report, which is a statutory requirement, relates to the work of Brockworth Parish Council for the year 2010/2011.

The report that follows describes the principal activities under taken by Brockworth Parish Council for the above period.

Planning

In 2010/2011 the Parish Council was asked to comment on 64 planning applications. It also provided a number of detailed responses to the Planning Inspectorate in respect of Planning Appeals. There are always difficulties and difference of opinion when determining planning applications, particularly in areas covered by Green Belt and AONB. Brockworth Parish Council is always concerned about future housing development on the consequential impact it has on its roads and other local services.

In last years report the Parish Council made strong comments on the development of the 72 houses in Kennel Lane which has now been permitted. There are, however, still concerns as to the access to the site through Green Bank.

However, there is an outline planning application in for 220 houses on Invista land which the Council has sent a strong objection to.

In addition to large developments, your Council comments on household developments and change of use applications and hope that you find it helpful when Councillors pay a visit to affected neighbouring properties in order that we can take their comments into consideration when dealing with these on your behalf.

The Shell land at the rear of the Cross Hands Garage, which has now been named 'Cross Hands Meadow', is still being well maintained. This year the Council has planted 100 trees which were given to the Council by The Woodland Trust.

The housing development on the old Shell site opposite the entrance to the business park has now been completed and many have been occupied. Also the housing development at Coopers Edge has started building again with many more houses being occupied.

Burial Ground

Last year it was reported that we have been successful in purchasing a further ¼ acre of land to cover the burial ground. The grass seed has now been sown, boundary fence installed with a new entrance from the existing burial ground. Cremation remains will soon be going into this area.

Your Council also covers the following areas:-

Rights of Way

The Council is always looking to ensure Rights of Way are kept clear, notifying Highways of potholes in roads and pavements and ensuring that waste and dog bins are kept emptied and in good condition. Doggie bags are available from the Community Centre, free of charge, I may add, to the residents of Brockworth on production of your address.

Also hedges and trees along pavements and roads – at this point I would like to ask residents if they could help their Council by keeping the hedges and trees which grow along public footpaths alongside their property cut on a regular basis to reduce the time and cost to your Council dealing with complaints.

Parks and Open Spaces

This council has, and are always looking to improve and maintain play equipment on land owned by the Parish.

No new equipment has been installed in either Pound Farm or Mill Lane playing fields again this year. As mentioned last year the safety surfaces which were due to be carried out has now been completed.

We have also had again a considerable amount of wilful damage done and along with routine maintenance the Council has spent around over £16,000 on the play areas. It would be helpful if any resident who saw any damage being carried out to notify the Police and the Council.

Negotiations are still on-going between the Parish Council and Brockworth Albion Football Club in relation to them building changing rooms on Mill Lane playing field.

Play Day Sunday, 22 May

Play Gloucestershire is holding a Play Day on Sunday, 22 May on the Mill Lane Playing Field for all the Family.

Annual Parish Fete

We are again holding this very successful event at Mill Lane playing field on 2 July, 2011.

In addition to last year's regulars, we are having Children's dance group, a Jazz Band and a traditional Punch & Judy, all of which are being held in the main arena. As well as the arena events the dog show will also be taking place and commencing a little earlier than the fete. The Challenge will also take place, the Scouts trying to defend the shield. We have received confirmation that a small Children's Fair will also be here on the day.

Bus Shelters

Last year I reported that we had fitted a new bus shelter close to Westfield Road traffic lights and have now added a perching bar to the shelter near the Victoria Inn and the shelter on the Shurdington Road. We are also talking to Gloucestershire County Council about a new shelter to go outside the Whittle Inn.

Brockworth News Letter

I hope you all enjoy reading the bi-monthly Parish Magazine, which the Scouts deliver to every Brockworth household on our behalf. Any local news or articles that you would like to be published should be sent to the Parish Office.

Community Building

The building has now been open for just over five years and we are pleased to report that the bookings for the main hall and other rooms are going better than last year with all offices being rented for long-term periods.

As stated last year, if you have any comments to make regarding any functions etc. please do contact Lorraine, the Administrator of the Community Centre, or write to the Parish Council.

The Coffee Shop is now open Monday, Tuesdays, Wednesdays, Thursdays and Fridays, 10am to 1.30pm for light lunches and refreshments, all at very reasonable prices. We also hold a Senior Citizens Luncheon Club every Friday at 12 noon for Brockworth Residents only, at a cost of £3.50 for a 2 course cooked lunch which includes a cup of tea or coffee. To ensure you get a seat bookings should be made in advance as we are only able to seat 30 people at any one time.

Community Bus

The money for the Community Bus, unfortunately, runs out on the 11 May. However, the Council is looking into whether we can obtain some more money to continue, if this fails I must say regrettably, the bus will not be able to continue.

Library & Youth Centre

As you are all aware Gloucestershire County Council has decided to withdraw permanent support to these services and to ensure that these are maintained the Council have in conjunction with the Brockworth Community Project produced a business plan for running these services together with a sum of £25,000. We should know very soon whether we have been successful.

Parish Plan

The Council has carried out a Parish Plan with the help of many local volunteers first in setting up a questionnaire, delivering and collecting the completed ones, out of the total number delivered 25% were returned, in the Council's opinion this was a very good response which when analysed will give the Council a very good idea as to what the residents of Brockworth would like to see or happen over the next five years, as a Parish Plan is usually carried out over that period.

The results will be announced in the next issue of the Parish magazine.

Forward Planning

As the Council has now carried out our Parish Plan and have 80% of Councillors elected, with Parish Clerk having obtained the necessary qualifications, it is the Council's intention next year to apply for 'Quality Parish Status'.

Financial

The Parish Clerk, Julie Shirley, will present the end of the year accounts at the end of my report.

Appreciation

The Council would like to thank all the Councillors who give a lot of their time in helping to run the Community Building and also to all the staff especially the Clerk, Julie Shirley, who has carried out an excellent job in getting the Council through in what has been a very difficult and busy year.

Appendix 2

To receive a statement of the Parish Council's Accounts for the year ending 31 March 2011.

The precept received by the Parish from Tewkesbury Borough Council for 2010/11 was set at £153,562 which was an increase over the previous year of nearly £12,000. We also received grants totalling £43,542. The precept for 2011/12 has been set at £153,000 so no increase this time.

Staff costs were £84,055 in the last year which is an increase of £15,949 over the previous year, this being due to taking on 2 new staff. Employees received no cost-of-living pay rise in the past year and will not be receiving one in the current financial year.

The Community Centre cost the parish council £70,701 to run in the past year, which was a decrease of £3,944. The Community Centre has again increased the amount of income it generates:

£18,177 in 2007/08

£28,077 in 2008/09

£44,906 in 2009/10

£51,182 in 2010/11

During the past year, the parish council has given out grants to local groups totalling £902.88 (list below). The parish council has also provided £4,000 to Brockworth Sports Centre, £2,000 to Brockworth Youth Centre, £2,000 towards the Summer Free Swimming, and £1,000 to Brockworth Enterprise School towards computers. The Community Bus was also run using the last of the Tesco developer money for the year at a cost of £22,722.

In addition the council spent £10,696 on grass cutting, £6,347 on Parks & Open Spaces, and £3,748 on Rights of Way maintenance. A further £16,748 was spent on refurbishing the safety surfacing at the Mill Lane playgrounds and the football pitches.

The year end accounts are being audited soon and are available to view on request up until 27th May 2011.

The surplus monies received will be added to the parish council's general reserves and used to support services such as the library and youth centre in the coming year.

Appendix 3 - Tewkesbury Borough Council Report

Working in partnership

We have continued to build on our work in previous years to share or work in partnership – to reduce costs and maintain quality.

We now share management with other councils in three more service areas - Internal Audit, Spatial Planning and Property Services.

Through the year we have been working with the other Gloucestershire districts to combine six separate home improvement contracts into one. Starting in June 2011 there will be a single county-wide Home Improvement Service.

The tourist information centre in Winchcombe is partly funded by the town council in order to retain opening hours to benefit local tourism.

All the dual-use sports centres are now run entirely by the schools. In October, the remaining facility at Bishops Cleeve was formally taken back by the school.

Savings and service improvements

The new recycling and waste collection scheme was introduced at the beginning of the year and has seen recycling rates significantly increase from 31 per cent to 53 per cent. This successful scheme not only means that less waste is going to landfill, but also that the range of items that can be recycled has increased.

Our environmental health unit continues to work with businesses, and consequently there has been a 5 per cent increase in food businesses that are compliant with hygiene legislation

Even before the budget statement all councils knew that savings would be required in the region of 28 per cent over a four year period starting 2011/12, and throughout the year the council has been working to identify these savings. Through this proactive work the council had already identified most of the savings required for 2011/12 (£1.563m), which was before the savings requirements had even been publicised.

Making a difference to people and communities

The Capital Grant Scheme was well used through the year (and will continue in 2011/12).

Although the annual budget is £250,000, the council was able to identify additional funding and consequently approved community grants totalling £339,000. The grants covered not only improvements to existing community buildings, but also a range of other projects including the installation of solar panels on the roof of a community centre.

In order to help organisations in the borough apply for funding from charitable or government bodies, the council fully funds a web based scheme (GrantNet) that identifies suitable funding for a range of schemes. Through this scheme local organisations have been awarded more than £96,000 by external funding bodies.

Our staff in the benefits section have worked hard to help families and individuals receive their full entitlements, and not only those relating to housing benefits. In the past 12 months, we have helped families and individuals gain more than £804,000 in extra benefits.

Similar support work in our housing section has helped 105 homeless people find accommodation and prevented 126 people from becoming homeless.

We continue to place an emphasis on working with young people, and in addition to working with schools, sports clubs and youth centres the council, ran a series of activity schemes during 2010/11. Those schemes attracted over 20,000 young people.

More than 56 per cent of the borough's flood alleviation projects have been delivered and many more projects are underway or scheduled. All projects were categorised (high, medium or low), and it is planned that the majority of high and medium projects will be completed during 2011/12. Of the £571,500 of funding available for these projects, Tewkesbury Borough Council has provided £157,000 and Severn Trent Water has provided £285,000. In addition, the council's annual drainage maintenance budget was increased from £18,000 to £50,000 from 2010/11.

Appendix 4 - Tree Warden Report May 2010 to May 2011

Introduction

I stressed in my report last year, the importance of the Parish Tree Warden being able to work with the Parish Council and the Community. During the past year, I have been called upon to help and advise the schools, we have planted trees, worked with the Borough Council to retain old trees and place a TPO on others, and with the help of the Parish Council started an Ancient Tree Log of old and notable trees in the village.

Ancient Tree Hunt

We have surveyed and recorded data with the Woodland Trust, of a number of very old trees and ancient within the parish. Some of these were done last year, but I discovered others on land near Abbotswood Farm and on Castle Hill. This job can be quite time consuming as the trees have to be measured and details of location, deterioration, invertebrates, fungus, lichens and wildlife activity assessed before data logging can be done.

If any members of the public are aware of any trees that are worthy of note or having a historic importance, please let myself or the parish office know.

Perry Pear Trees Kennel Lane

I said in the report last year, that we had been unsuccessful in placing a Tree Preservation Order on two very old Perry Pear trees on land proposed for development at Kennel Lane despite them being of a historic value and an amenity asset right next to the public footpath.

In February of this year the detailed plans for this site were submitted to TBC and included not just two, but all three of the Perry Pear trees in a landscaped buffer zone at the edge of the site. However, as far as I am aware those plans have not yet been approved so we must continue to keep watch.

Tree Preservation Order St Georges Hall

Members of the parish were shocked to see tree surgeons and chain saws turn up last October at St George's Church hall car park in court Road, intending to fell three mature trees.

Quick action by Councillor Maureen Rowcliffe-Quarry, and a very quick response from the Landscape Officer at TBC placed these trees on an emergency TPO (Tree Preservation Order). We then had to follow up with the normal process of a TPO, but fortunately the trees met every criteria required for a preservation order and the TPO was made permanent on 9 December 2010.

We are grateful to the church wardens and other members of the church council, who helped to deal with this in a sympathetic and responsible way.

Tree Planting Cross Hands Meadow

Last year Woodland Trust were offering free tree packs to parishes and communities where they could be planted as part of a community or woodland project. With the help of the parish clerk, we were successful in our application for a Wildlife Pack, of 105 saplings that will grow and develop into a suitable habitat and food source for wildlife.

On Saturday 11 December 2010, despite the cold weather 20 parishioners and councillors turned out for a community tree planting on the Cross Hands Meadow to the rear of the Cross Hands Garage. The Tree Guards and Stakes were very kindly provided by the Parish Council.

During the half term period in February some of these newly planted trees were damaged by three youths from the village. Thankfully due to the quick action of a local resident, the parish office, myself and the police, the vandals were caught and dealt with by the Police, fortunately all but one of the damaged trees were saved.

In a more recent incident a number of support canes had to be replaced. They were probably stolen for tomato canes.

If this year's application is successful we will be able to plant some more trees on the site later this year.

A46 Painswick Road

A large number of mature trees had to be felled as part of the work to stabilise the ground on the Painswick Road. The Highways Authority had included tree planting with a ten year management plan in the scheme. The work is now nearing completion so we must ensure that the tree planting is done at the appropriate time, this autumn.

Brockworth Nature Reserve

Many people may not be aware that we have a small Nature Reserve at Nature Close in Brockworth. Early last year I was asked by the Borough Council to advise on trees and shrubbery at the nature reserve. For whatever reason much of the green wildlife corridor and part of the reserve had deteriorated, to the point of being almost ineffective. To make the reserve viable, these needed to be replaced and the reserve secured. The response from TBC has been swift and positive, new trees have been planted and fencing erected. As recently as this week I have been talking with members of TBC, and have agreed that I will go into the reserve and remove bramble and undergrowth to let in the sunlight to bring the reserve back to its original state as a viable wildlife habitat.

Most of the local residents that I have spoken to are very pleased that work is being done at the site and have been very helpful, providing old photographs and a copy of the original plan from 1993. Our grateful thanks must go to them all for their support.

Thanks and Appreciation

Looking back over the past year, quite a lot has been achieved. We have helped with advice on tree management, we have been donated trees by local people, asked for help and advice for the schools, and have been given help and encouragement by neighbours and dog walkers keeping an eye on the development of the work we have done.

I must thank the previous Parish Council and Councillors for their support, and especially Julie and Fay the in the Parish Office for all that they do.

Brockworth Tree Records

When I attend the Tree Council Forum's, we are asked by the Tree Council to encourage our parish councils to keep tree records, involve the schools and the community in tree planting, and to create an interest in trees for now and in the future. I am delighted to say that in Brockworth we are doing that.
